REFLECTIONS...

I heard once that every rabbi gives just one sermon, in different shades and colors, throughout their rabbinate. One theme with many variations. At the time, it seemed insulting to suggest

that even the most seasoned and brilliant rabbis could not come up with new ideas to write about over time. But now that I have been a rabbi for 3 years—and a sermon-writing cantor before that for 15—I understand that this idea is, in fact true. It's not that we never think of novel things to say, it's that when it comes down to it, every rabbi, and therefore by extension, every human, has one (or maybe 2) repetitive themes that define who they are and how they view the world, and every sermon becomes a reflection of that perspective. I used to think of this circular pattern of thinking as a broken record, a bad thing, a mental habit that I can't break. I've now come to appreciate my view of the world and my sermon themes as the Torah that I'm meant to teach in my lifetime.

If you have heard me give a sermon, then you likely know that my Torah always has something to do with the messy, uncomfortable, wild wilderness of being a human being. A type-A Virgo who loves order and structure, I have spent my life trying to fit everything neatly into boxes and places of belonging. The older I get, the more I understand that life is not neat or controllable. It is unpredictable and so very messy and our job is not to hold on even tighter in the face of such chaos but to let go and see what kind of grace appears when we are in free fall.

This has never been more true than in the last few months when the world opened up and we felt free again! Good riddance to those pesky masks! However, Covid had different plans. As I write this article, Covid is on a vengeful contagious streak and the fear and uncertainty of early Covid days have returned. How do we plan the High Holidays? Or a summer trip on an airplane? Or a desperately needed dance party? How do we find our solid center on top of shifting ground?

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Friends, we've just come through a challenging year. Yet, we are still standing, still welcoming, and still providing our congregational family with the spiritual and communal experiences we have come to expect from our little

shul on the hill.

This year, despite the last-minute surge in Covid cases, we swiftly changed from what we had hoped would be in-person to meaningful and moving hybrid High Holidays services for the CBT community and our many guests. Together we raised nearly \$53,000 in our high holiday appeal with 165 of us supporting our loving home. We had a wonderful celebration of Hanukkah with many of us lighting our chanukiyot together during an uplifting service. Over 80 people joined together for our community in-person Seder to share in the spirit of rebirth and renewal. We launched our new adult b'nai mitzvah class with 18 participants. Our religious school is thriving with 104 students and a wonderful new Director of Education, Melissa Rogoway.

We are now planning for the 2022/2023 fiscal year. The CBT Board of Trustees is submitting our annual budgets for the Religious School and the Synagogue for your approval. The Board approved the budgets unanimously and we urge you to vote "yes." The budgets contain modest increases in congregational commitment and religious school tuition that are lower than the annual inflation rate. We are also increasing salaries for our staff.

Although the synagogue budget projects a deficit, the success of our L'Chaim Gala, the return of the annual Restaurant Walk, the return of Tikvah Take-Out, and by monetizing our building by making it available for events such as weddings and other social activities, we will be able to build for the future. To that end, we have budgeted for a part-time marketing professional to guide us on how to "sell" the brand we project. We have also budgeted for a part-time individual to search out and apply for grants that we can use to expand our programming.


Shabbat with CBT Neighbors

When I was 12 years old, all the girls in my grade in Savyon, Israel studied for our B'not Mitzvah (plural for Bat Mitzvah) in a combined program that culminated in a grade-level ceremony celebrating our milestone together. At that time in Israel, girls didn't have the privilege to go up to

the Torah the way our male counterparts did, and so we had a lovely ceremony for us girls, receiving our first siddurim. Savyon is a very small town, and all 20 girls in our grade knew each other very well, almost like a family. The B'not Mitzvah program took place after school at our neighborhood synagogue, about 200 yards away from our school. As part of this program, we were to go to a Shabbat dinner hosted by modern orthodox families who lived in our otherwise secular neighborhood. I had no idea that not all the kids in our neighborhood attended our local school and had assumed that I knew all the kids in Savyon who were my age. To my great surprise, I was invited to a house with a girl who, like me, was 12. She lived so close to my house that it took me only five minutes to walk over in my new Shabbat dress that my mom had bought me for this special occasion. I spent that Shabbat getting to know my orthodox neighbors, and it was one of the most magical Shabbatot I have experienced in my life. Walking to her house I didn't know what to expect. Was I dressed nicely enough? Were they going to judge me? Were there special Shabbat etiquettes I was not aware of? My worries were in vain; they were the most gracious hosts and made me feel at home as soon as I stepped in. While I was sitting there and sharing this wonderful dinner with them, all the differences between us melted away, and we were just neighbors of the same faith celebrating an ancient tradition together. At the end of the evening, I had a new friend from this version of Shabbat on the Block.

In 2018, I brought this concept of getting to know our neighbors with a Shabbat dinner to CBT with our first annual Shabbat on the Block – it was an instant hit! That first year, 157 of us celebrated Shabbat in our own neighborhoods. What was so special about this evening? Us – CBT members getting to know each other across generations and within close geographical proximity more deeply. It gave all of us an opportunity to not only meet our fellow CBT family

members but to really get to know

The answer is that we do not. There is no rock-solid ground on which we can depend, so we must stop stepping down and imagining that it will be there. What we must do, instead, is find the lessons and the growth that are waiting for us as we wade our way through the murky middle. We must find the wisdom of what Rabbi Rachel Barenblat calls "humble not-knowing, and the splendor of not making ourselves afraid." If we can find the courage to let go and be curious, we will not be greeted by fear, but rather by our reflections in the mirror, and by the knowledge that it is only when we surrender that we discover just who we are meant to be. May this summer be a time of self-discovery, joy, and renewal for all of us.

Our school would be a less vibrant place without them.

Also, we anticipate that the Board will be recommending a successor contract for Rabbi Chabon shortly. Rabbi Chabon is an integral part of CBT's future. The successor contract must be approved by the congregation. I hope I will be able to report at the annual meeting that we have finalized the contract.

Please vote. Please try to attend the Annual Meeting in person. Our community is strong when we all participate and congregate. I look forward to seeing you there, I loved seeing you at the gala, and I look forward to listening to your feedback about the budget or any other congregational matter.

Our CBT community is our very own tree of life, standing on our roots, and flourishing. It is our past and our future; it is why we are all here. We are here for


