### **REFLECTIONS...**

#### Dear friends,

I have exciting news! The leadership of CBT has decided that it is time for us to engage in a strategic planning process, something that has been on our minds for a long time but which we have been unable to

begin for many reasons until now. When I first became the rabbi of CBT in 2019, we had many wonderful conversations about who we were as a community then and who we wanted to become. Then the world shut down, and our conversations were understandably put on hold. It is only now that we feel able to come up for air and think once again about the future of our beautiful community.

In the 20 years that I have been serving here, we have never engaged in a strategic planning process. The present moment has always been so consuming that we have not been able to lift our eyes from the details of everyday shul life to be able to move them to the horizon. But we have finally made it and I could not be more happy to share this news. We have hired Dale Glasser to guide us through the process. Dale is an immensely talented and experienced consultant and trainer who worked for 16 years as the senior management consultant at the URJ. He knows congregations better than anyone we could have found, and we are thrilled he can work with us.

To make this process valuable we need your help! This summer, we will contact key stakeholders at CBT to have conversations with Dale to prepare him to meet our community. At the same time, we will create a strategic planning task force to be our emissaries for this critical work in the year ahead. August 10-11 Dale will come to Walnut Creek to hold focus groups and a leadership training seminar for our community. You are all invited to participate in the focus groups, as Dale wants to listen deeply to the voices of our members so he can understand who we are now and who we want to become.

How can you help? When someone from CBT calls to ask you to participate, say yes! Please sign up to be in one of the focus groups. They will each last just one hour and we want your voices to be heard. We cannot

#### What Will the Future Look Like?

The Talmud tells the story of Moses atop Mount Sinai waiting for God to finish up the Torah. God is affixing the crowns, the fancy frilly bits at the top of each Hebrew letter. With

some amount of chutzpah, Moses asks why God is holding up the process by messing with the crowns. God responds, because someone will come along "a few generations from now" (in actuality about 1300 years give or take) who will generate from these "crowns" mountains of laws, giving us a whole new understanding of Judaism. That person is the great first-century scholar Rabbi Akiva. Moses asks God to show him this man. So God puts Moses into Rabbi Akiva's academy to study. And Moses shrinks as he realizes he has no idea what Akiva is talking about or what is even happening in this room. But when a student asks Rabbi Akiva how he arrived at a particular conclusion, Akiva says, "Because Moses received this

law at Mount Sinai and passed it on to succeeding generations." Is it the worst game of telephone ever, that Moses can't recognize his teachings filtered through a millennium of learning? Or is it the genius of Judaism? That we change, that we adapt, that each generation makes new

meaning of our master narrative and continues to make

our tradition relevant for each succeeding generation. I remember once reconsidering how or whether to continue to offer a 7th-grade trip to Los Angeles at another local congregation. When we proposed a change to the program, a parent of a rising 7th grader (who had an older child who had been on a prior trip) said, "But we've always done this trip in this way." We had done it for 3 years. The congregation was over 100 years old. Had we really always done it this way? Or had we just begun to reimagine the 7th-grade trip and play with what is possible?

Over the past year, our Reimagine Task Force has been exploring what else our education programs at B'nai Tikvah might be. We've looked at CBT's history and a wide range of innovative models for Jewish congregational schools. We've begun to explore

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As we close the 2023-2024 fiscal year, I am filled with a sense of gratitude and excitement for what we have accomplished. Our synagogue has seen membership growth, resilience, and positive change. At the Annual Meeting, we approved the 2024-2025

CBT budget, the 2024-2025 Religious School budget, the slate of Board Nominees, and amendments to CBT's Bylaws. Below is some information regarding the approved CBT budget and the amendments to the Bylaws.

This past year, CBT has thrived in many ways. We have come together in prayer, community, and solidarity to support one another through the rise of antisemitism and the war. We have shown up for each other in the joyful and painful moments. We have deepened our connections, forged new friendships, and welcomed new members with warmth and community.

Our projected deficit for this past 2023-2024 fiscal year is approximately \$8,000 less than planned. We are thankful that our annual gala was successful and brought in revenue to reach our fundraising goal. A big thank you to Amanda Regenstein, Andrea Slavet, and the entire gala committee for all their hard work in making this year's gala a success!

The Board looks forward to a new year ahead as we focus on being fiscally responsible. One of the most significant milestones we have reached this year is the achievement of a balanced budget, free from deficit for the first time in years. Presenting a realistic budget to our congregation was one of my first goals when I became President. The Board presented our community with two 2024-2025 budgets. The first showed a deficit of just under \$130,000 and was in the spirit of transparency regarding CBT's financial situation. The second was a balanced budget which was approved at our annual meeting. The difference between the two budgets is hiring an Executive Director. For the next year, we will operate under the balanced budget because I will continue in my dual roles as President and Executive Director as a volunteer without pay. I have been serving as the Executive Director since October 7, 2023, and am giving my time to ensure our

### **CONTRA COSTA MIDRASHA**

We are SO excited to start 2024-25 at Contra Costa Midrasha. Before we dive into our new year, I want to share some of the biggest accomplishments of this past year, 2023-24.

- Our overall student enrollment was up by 20% with a class of 23 teens graduating this May.
- CCM's retreats program now called "Bay Yachad" included over 9 teen-serving organizations from all over the Bay Area with 116 teens attending at least one retreat. (Though 60% attended two or more.)
- The Hamsa Fund teens raised \$4000 which they donated to the Jewish Community Relations Council, Youth Homes and CASA.
- Impact Builder dedicated their whole year to working with Tiny Village Spirit and hope to help them move into their facility early next year.
- Better Together's intergenerational programming bonded 19 elders and 25 teens, ending their year with a pickle making party!

Numbers don't tell the whole story. Here are my favorite quotes from some of our graduating teens telling why Midrasha was so meaningful and memorable for them:

"Midrasha is not just a weekly event for me: it's my home, my haven, where I truly feel alive and a place where I've formed deep connections with amazing friends." -Noah

"During my time at Midrasha, I discovered a vibrant Jewish community for teens just like me. Every Wednesday night, I looked forward to a place where I knew I would be accepted and loved for who I am. I learned what it means to be included, uplifted and unconditionally supported by a whole community. Midrasha also solidified my connection to Judaism. May we continue to learn and grow together, carrying the light of Midrasha wherever we go." -Avria

"Every single retreat I went on it felt like my soul was getting glued back together - back to its fullest potential because each retreat was filled with so much love and enjoyment that it truly was a healing experience." -Allison

possibilities for the future. We are now at the hardest part of the journey, the part where we decide on a new direction and make a commitment to change.

Listening to the podcast On Being recently, I heard philanthropist and social entrepreneur Azita Ardakan Walton talking about applying nature's principles to economics, social organizations, and design (a field called biomimicry). She noted, "In the natural world … there is replication of things that work until they don't. [...] There might be a strategy or a response type that works for a million years. But million year day two, if it doesn't work anymore, i.e. doesn't serve the collective vitality, [nature] will respond otherwise. And it's not attached to the thing that used to work before."

The religious school as an institution is just over 100 years old in America. B'nai Tikvah's religious school dates back to the 1980s with the inception of our community. We are nowhere close to million year day two but we do have a model that no longer serves the "collective vitality" here at CBT and in the larger Jewish community. According to a recent study by the Jewish Education Project, Hebrew school enrollment across the U.S. dropped by 40% between 2006 and 2019 and more than a quarter of religious schools closed. That was before the pandemic, and we believe these numbers are higher now.

"Nature's not attached to the thing that used to work before." Not because it never worked, wasn't a great idea, or didn't serve a purpose, but because it's not serving the "collective vitality" now. What will serve our collective vitality now? What will make us come alive in new ways? Let's look into the future and find out. Page 6 Tikva

doors stay open. As much as we would like to hire an Executive Director, it just isn't fiscally possible or responsible to do so this year. The Board and I are working to improve CBT's finances so we can hire someone next fiscal year. Transparency is something I promised from day one, therefore, the Board and I felt strongly that you should see both budgets so as not to mislead you regarding where we stand financially.

Our biggest source of income is membership dues. This year, the Board voted to increase membership dues by 5% and to implement a new level of membership, Kehilah. Full dues for 2024-2025 will be \$3230. Kavod membership will increase to \$4,000 and Kehilah our new inclusive membership level is \$5400. This level includes the building fee, oneg fee, guest High Holiday Tickets, Shabbat dinners, and anything offered at CBT. It just excludes fundraising events. For those who cannot pay full dues, I invite you to have a conversation with me to ensure we are at a level that is comfortable for you. We are taking steps to increase our membership and developing new fundraising opportunities so we can continue to offer programming that is meaningful to our community.

Security continues to be a priority. Our gate is almost functioning, I hope to update you very soon once we have the green light! We recently were awarded \$10,000 from the SF Federation Micro Grant Program. We will use this money to upgrade the lighting outside and in our amphitheater. In addition, we received \$250,000 from the California Office of Emergency Services which will provide us additional security upgrades to our building. The OES awarded money to only 15% of those who applied and awarded 100% of the requested funds to an even smaller group of grantees. We are very thankful to have been one of the fortunate grantees to receive 100% of our requested grant. We owe a big thank you to Susanne Revutsky who supported our community by writing this grant with me.

In your Annual Meeting packet, you received proposed amendments to the Bylaws. There are two main purposes for these amendments. The first is to add two additional At Large Trustees to the Board. As you may recall, when we rewrote the Bylaws in 2021, we went from a Board of over 20 members, down to 11 members. Since then, the Board has realized that more Trustees July-September 2024

are needed to do all the work and to have a reliable succession plan for officer roles. At the annual meeting, we approved to move forward with adding two additional positions to increase the size of the Board to 13 members. The other main revision concerns the Executive Director position. To give the Board flexibility in hiring someone to be the chief administrator of our congregation, we have proposed amending the Bylaws to allow the Board to hire a chief administrator and tailor that position to the organization's administrative and fiscal needs.

At our annual meeting I shared that we recently sold our domain name, Tikvah.org, and will change our website to tikvaheastbay.org. Another organization had a compelling offer for our domain name and support in designing and building our new website. We are excited to offer our community an improved user experience on our new website. I hope by the High Holidays - or shortly after - we will be up and running.

I want to thank each of you for your ongoing support, dedication, and partnership. I also want to thank our Nominating Co-Chairs, Jenn Leeds and Chanel Benhamou along with Glenn Gould, Scott Regenstein, and Idelle Lipman for providing us with our board slate for this fiscal year. Together we are building a stronger, more vibrant, and more inclusive synagogue community that serves as a beacon of hope and light in an often dark world. My wish for the next year is that we all show up to support our community. It takes a village to keep CBT what we want it to be. So please get involved, join a committee, volunteer, come to services, and show up for your community.

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
