(consistent from week to week) who are given a 10-minute challenge to complete as a team. Everyone on the team must participate. We have done 3-legged relays, balanced objects on rudimentary scales, led one another in trust walks, created composite portraits of our teammates, told Jewish jokes and so much more.

At the conclusion of each activity every team must link the activity with the value of the day, i.e. nedivut/ generosity, simcha/joy, kehillah/community, kavod/ respect, as in, "How was generosity necessary to complete today's task?" Once we made our way through our ten core values, teams shifted to identifying 1-3 values they used that day to complete the task at hand. In this way we begin to relate our abstract Jewish values to concrete lived experiences of play, collaboration, and the work of being in community with one another.

Teams are deliberately mixed-age and randomized, not chosen by students. The practice is to employ these values with everyone, to work on building connections with people we don't know, who are hard for us, who feel random. This makes us work harder to build our values muscles while we are also building a broader and deeper sense of our CBT community.

Our teams are also leaderless. The kids have to figure out how to organize themselves week over week. The variety of tasks emphasizes different skills in different weeks so that kids with different skill sets can shine. Part of the work is for the kids to figure out amongst themselves how to tackle the task at hand. Sometimes it works great. Sometimes it's a hot mess. There are disagreements and bad ideas. There are kids who wander off or feel excluded. Thirteen weeks in, kids are starting to identify when they break down as a team and are learning to recover. They are looking out for each other and correcting their mistakes. They are reaching out to ensure everyone is included.

Through playful active learning our kids are thoughtfully practicing bringing their Jewish values to life, not just so they can do that work at CBT, but so they can bring it home, to the classroom, recess, lunch room, playdates, extra-curricular activities. So that being their righteous Jewish selves all day, every day is instinctive; it's embodied Torah, in their mouths and in their hearts.

# **CONTRA COSTA MIDRASHA**

Highlights from our Fall 2024 semester include:

• Wednesday night programming this October featured a visit from Olympic gold medalist, Amit Elor. She shared an amazing slide show and told us how it felt to win Olympic gold, how much she loved connecting with the Israeli athletes in Paris and answering questions from our teens about competing and daily training work.

• November featured our first retreat of the year amidst the redwood trees in the Santa Cruz mountains. While Havdalah always takes my breath away, this retreat a number of B'nai Tikvah teens read Torah and gave the D'var Torah about Abraham's journey out of Ur and towards Canaan.

• In December we held a Giving Circle between seniors citizens and teens. A Giving Circle is a chance for a group of people to pool their charitable funds to donate to chosen non-profit organizations the group picks. Almost 40 teens, seniors and educators joined together to talk about giving, tzedakah and volunteering. They examined five non-profits and picked Tiny Village Spirit, a group building tiny homes in Richmond for youth experiencing homelessness.

• Impact Builder teens are doing a three-month dive into the world of free bike repair and maintenance with The Crucible in Oakland.

• We have a retreat at the end of January and the middle of March! We can't wait to have more time in nature, away from technology and immersed in Jewish



community and Shabbat.




